Carl Bowlby nominated the Board of Directors that you subsequently voted to elect. I don't know where the magic came in, but you, the membership, came up with an all-star Board of Directors. In addition, Art Kavan, as the outgoing president, has agreed to join of Board of Directors in accordance with the Club's by-laws. His experience is proving to be invaluable to us. This Board is interested, concerned, and they came to work. Working with them is truly a pleasure.

We have had two Board of Directors' meetings already and have accomplished quite a bit. We started out with a list of issues, concerns, or items that we thought should be addressed. We scoped the list down to the most important things that we thought we could accomplish during this year.

The Board approved \$400.00 to spend on the purchase of silver smithing equipment as presented by John Poole. This equipment is necessary in order to conduct the silver smithing course.

Additionally, the Board of Directors authorized the implementation and use of punch passes and sign-in sheets. Donna Pugh designed and produced these items with Board approval. Thank you Donna for a job well done. (For additional information regarding punch passes and sign-in sheets, see section in this newsletter entitled: <u>PUNCH PASSES AND SIGN-IN</u> <u>SHEETS</u>.) This system will go into effect after the March 12, 2005 general business meeting.

By using the punch pass and sign-in sheet system, we will have a better idea of the specific facilities being used, how many of the members are utilizing the labs, and gain an understanding of the adequacy of the shops' equipment. Also, monitors will know if unauthorized persons or non-members are in the facilities and using the equipment. As a nonprofit corporation, we need to have appropriate records available in the event of a possible audit.

The Board's responsibility to provide leadership and guidance to the Club and the Club's membership requires that it knows all of the activities conducted in its facility. Towards that object, I need a complete listing of shop monitors and Club instructors. <u>All monitors and in-</u> <u>structors please contact me by</u> <u>March 1, 2005.</u>

When I became president, I was handed a bundle of keys. Many of these keys' functions are unknown. It quickly became apparent that there is no complete master list for who has keys and which key goes with which facility. This is unsatisfactory. The Board and I need to know who has keys to which facilities. There needs to be a complete set or keys available in case of emergency to allow access into each facility. I need to be contacted by anyone who feels they need access to which facility. Then, we will rekey the club facilities as appropriate. IT IS IMPERATIVE THAT YOU CONTACT ME TO LET ME KNOW YOUR REQUIREMENTS. Otherwise, you may not have the access you think you require. The Board of Directors have voted to re-key the facility right after the March 12, 2005 business meeting.

Tom Miller is the Chairperson for this year's nominating committee. Please see him if you would like to be an officer or a member of the Board of Directors. Also, contact him with the name or names of those club members who you would recommend for club service. (Only recommend someone you know who would be willing to do the job).

Phil Babcock is the Program/ Class



chairperson. Please see him regarding these activities. He is especially interested if you have a briefing, talk, or presentation. I know I am ready for some outstanding presentations.

Rockhounding. Members interested in 'hounding please contact Rim Tallat-Kelpsa, Don Feyrer, or me and tell us what you can do to support or lead a trip and where you want to go. As rockhounds we are always looking for a new place to go or a chance to revisit a particularly good place. The weather is good and getting better. If we are going on a trip in the future, we need to begin plan**ning now**. Without a plan, things rarely happen, so come on, take some responsibility and get involved. As my old boss used to say, "if you don't know where you are going, any road will get you there." Let's make a plan and let's fly that plan. With no plans, nothing is going to happen. There, I am out of adages.

PUNCH PASSES AND SIGN-IN SHEETS

The Board has authorized the use of serialized, punch-passes and sign-in sheets for members utilizing the Club's open labs. The serialized punch passes will be available through the Club's Treasurer and shop monitors.

All members using the Club's facilities will sign in for each session listing their name, punch pass number, time in/out, and other information as called for on the sign-in sheet. Members will sign in also when paying cash by the hour (\$2,00 per hour). Each monitor will provide a separate sign-in sheet for each open shop period. The monitor may use that sheet repeated for that same period (e.g. every Tuesday evening 6 to 9 PM.) until it is full and then will turn it into the Treasurer. This system will go into effect after the March 12, 2005 general business meeting. At that time, old punch passes may be exchanged for the new punch passes with the existing punches transferred to the new card.

TUCSON CACTUS & SUCCULENT SOCIETY

Cacti and succulents are all around us in Arizona. However, many of them are being lost and destroyed during the construction blading practices in new home development and, in general, new construction projects. The Tucson Cactus & Succulent Society (TC&SS) has a cactus rescue program.

By working with developers, more than 4,000 cacti were saved last year. Each cactus Rim Tallat-Kelpsa

requires an Arizona tag which cost \$1 for plants under 8 inches and \$5 for all larger ones. The rescue crewmembers can keep what they like by paying for the tags. The majority of the plants are distributed through sales, donations, and re-vegetation projects in public areas.

The Tucson Cactus & Succulent meetings are held the first Thursday of every month at the Junior League of Tucson at 2099 E. River Road at 7:00 PM Each meeting features an interesting speaker.

The rescued plants gotten through the (TC&SS) activities and the rocks collected through OPLC field trips present a great opportunity to xeriscape (desert landscape) your home for a nominal cost and to gain the satisfaction of preserving desert life.

THE GREAT TREASURE HUNT

Recollections of Art, the Desert Rat

In the years shortly after moving to Tucson, Art Kavan started writing a series of anecdotes describing some of his Arizona adventures as only he can. Here's one he calls The Great Treasure Hunt.


It starts, "My daughter-in-law had a new baby and as is the custom in her family, the mother and father come for a week or two and help her out. The father, who is named Arthur like myself, has a similar interest. So, when he knew he was coming, he wanted to know if I would take him to Arivaca treasure hunting with gold detectors. I hadn't been out in the mountains for a couple of years but I thought it would be great, I knew of an old Spanish village that is so remote the coyotes can't find it. Oh, I forgot to mention he is seventy years old and I am now sixty.

Anyway we get the date set and it comes. I pick him up in my four-wheel drive and we head out. The first stop is the grocery store to pick up a couple of hoagies for our lunch and then it's the highway for a seventy five mile drive to Arivaca. Life is good, all is well! From Arivaca we head south and get off the beaten path to pursue our endeavors (big words for me) and things are starting to look familiar.

About this time Art starts complaining that he has to go number two and I better stop or he is about to have an accident. I tell him to hold on for a few more miles as I'll stop at this old black man's camp. I finally get there and I've never seen a seventy year old man move so fast, he ran over the hill and out of sight. I figured he didn't want me to hear any screaming or unfamiliar noises so I wandered around looking for interesting rocks and killing time. Talk about time, I thought he must have taken the Sunday newspaper with him. I thought it was getting around lunch time, and I finally saw him coming up the hill and he had his treasure finder with him, I half expected to see the roll of toilet paper dragging behind him but, no.

After I gave him a little history of this black man's camp, we got in the car and continued on. We went through several gates and the road kept getting rougher and rougher, just as I remembered it. We were driving down a wash and I pointed to the black man's four-wheel drive still upside down in the wash after he got caught in a down pour and he lost his vehicle but escaped with his life, never to return. We stopped at an Old Spanish mission that was later turned into a ranch

and I pointed out to him where the Indians used to camp in order to get



food from the mission.

Now, the Spanish village was only a mile away. I went up this wash that was the wrong one and we had so much debris like tree branches and brush on the windshield that we had to stop. I said let's walk and take our gear with us. Well, after three quarters of a mile through thick brush and past several beehives that Art was concerned if they were killer bees, which they probably were, I convinced him that at a temperature of sixty I didn't think they would attack. They sure were making a lot of noise and I think it was for them to keep warm. They didn't bother us the whole day.

We finally made it back to the car and continued back and this time I found the right wash and up it we went. It started getting very rough and I put two big dents on the passenger side in my blazer. Then, as we were pulling into the village it was really rough and Art said you better go that way and I said no I am going this way.
