• Kevin Lane Smith, a Tucson jewelry artist, gave a superbly illustrated talk displaying his original art work, done largely in gold and mixed gemstones.

- Helen Serras-Herman reported a nearly full schedule of talks for 2019.
- Breakfast snacks for the January meeting were procured by Leia Ballard. Thank you, Leia.
- November's meeting minutes were approved by the membership.
- Seven new members were introduced to the membership. Also, Chuck Lundstrom, who taught the casting class for many years, has returned to Tucson and the club.
- The new Executive and Board are in place, and their contact information will be posted in the next newsletter. David Schulte remains as President, Victoria Fila as Vice President, William Penrose as Secretary, and Pat Droll as Treasurer. David Richardson is joining the Board, as well as taking charge of the Silent Auction and faceting lab owner. Janet Keisler is now Membership Chairman, while Wayne Klement will continue doing many of the other essential tasks he has been doing for years.
- The President personally thanked Bob Powell, Wayne Klement, Tom McDevitt, and Abe and Norma Lackow for the necessary and sometimes invisible tasks they've been doing for years, without which the club could not sustain itself. Bob Powell will remain on the Board as Member at Large. Tom McDevitt will contribute where needed, especially helping with the Silent Auction.
- The Treasurer reported a total of \$5900 in cash and \$34,369 in CDs. The problem of the nonexistent CDs has finally been resolved.


• The Membership Chairman reported 515 members. 2019 dues are now due and must be paid before using the lab facilities, in part for insurance reasons.

February, 2019 OPLC Speaker: Luis Alberto Quispe Aparicio



We are very fortunate to continue our New Year 2019 with another wonderful international gem artist, Luis Alberto Quispe Aparicio, who will be our speaker for our February 2, 2019 OPLC monthly meeting.

Luis Alberto Quispe Aparicio follows a second generation family tradition, since 1968, in the creation of objects d'art and gemstone carving. An engineer by profession, he grew up surrounded by art, sculpture, minerals & gemstones; artists, master carvers and jewelers were ingrained in his everyday life at his family studio in Lima, Peru where he spent most of his formative years. His knowledge on precious stones was organically acquired during constant visits to mines around the world where he hunted for exceptional gemstones; making the quest for rarity and quality an exquisite lifetime pursuit.

His art is characterized by the fusion of sculpting techniques and jewelry fabrication, the use of exceptional gemstones, the daring design and the flawless execution carried out by hand which is vital in order to give a soul to each creation. His studio specializes in carving ruby.

After mastering his craft, Luis moved to Paris in search for a new vision and to broaden his scope through the specialization in luxury goods, soon after in 2013 he founded L'AQUART, a brand that specializes in the creation of ultra-luxury utilitarian art objects mainly composed in precious and semi-precious stones. His works are displayed in museums in the United States (Carnegie in Pittsburgh, Lizzadro Museum of Lapidary Art in Chicago, GIA museum in Carlsbad) and Europe (Museum of Natural History, Vienna, Austria, Deustsches Edelsteinmuseum, Idar-Oberstein, Germany) and enjoyed by private collectors around the World.

FEBRUARY'S BIRTHSTONE: AMETHYST

Unlike January, a month with an entire *species* of gemstone, February goes the opposite direction: it aggrandizes a particular variety of one of the most common minerals on Earth - the tectosilicate quartz, and particularly quartz's beautiful and colorful violet-hued variety *Amethyst*. Quartz occurs in a large number of varieties. They are divided into common macrocrystalline varieties (in which color is the essential criterion), and microcrystalline varieties, consisting of small fibrous or granular crystallites (these microcrystalline varieties include all chalcedonies, agates, and jaspers that we lapidaries are so fond of cutting...) Amethyst is a macrocrystalline variety found in shades of violet owing to the presence of small amounts of iron (as Fe3+) as an impurity. Amethyst, like all macrocrystalline quartz, commonly forms as trigonal crystals.

These crystals are typically prismatic, consisting of a hexagonal prism, terminated by two rhombohedra, together resembling a hexagonal bipyramid when uniformly developed; to this can be added a trigonal bipyramid, and occasionally the general crystal form, a trigonal trapezohedron. The trapezohedron reveals the true symmetry of quartz and shows whether a crystal is "right-handed" or "left-handed" - when a trapezohedral face is located above and to the right in relation to a prism face viewed from the front, the crystal is right-handed; in the opposite case, the crystal is left-handed. Twinning is very common, and typical twin laws include Dauphine, Brazil, and Japan. It has no cleavage planes and a conchoidal fracture. Hardness is 7.0 (Moh's Scale), and density is 2.65. Amethyst has a vitreous luster and is transparent to translucent. All macrocrystalline quartz is fairly pure chemically; the impurities that cause color are found in incredibly minute amounts. In the crystal structure of quartz, the [SiO4] tetrahedra are arranged in helices parallel with the *c* axis of the crystal. The helices are either right– or left-handed and are linked sideways such that every [SiO4] tetrahedron shares all four corners with others. Quartz is widespread in many geological environments, and is an essential mineral in many metamorphic rocks such as gneisses, mica-schists, quartzites, and eclogites, and in Si-rich igneous rocks such as granites and grandiorites, including the related pegmatites and veins (these are where our facet-grade amethysts come from!) Owing to it's great hardness and chemical resistance, quartz is the principal mineral in many consolidated or unconsolidated sediments, such as sandstones, conglomerates, and the like.

Amethyst is found all over the world, and important gem deposits include Brazil, Russia, Uraguay, Bolivia, Africa, and even the Four Peaks area here in Arizona, among many others. Specimen collectors appreciate these and many more, including Vera Cruz and Guerrero, Mexico. Facetors like myself are always on the hunt for crystals of "Siberian" color - those of deep purple with flashes of blue, violet, and red. Though the term "Siberian" is still used today, most of the famous Russian material was faceted long ago (I have seen true Siberian material, and it was not terribly impressive - the good ones are long gone!) Top-color and clarity amethyst is best in the Uraguayan material, which falls into the "most expensive quartz variety" category! The best and biggest gem-quality crystals can run as much as \$5 per carat in the rough, with finished prices often exceeding the \$100/ct. mark! Though amethyst is common, don't expect to find the "perfect" piece of facet rough without sorting many parcels - I myself am still on the quest after 25 years of searching! Top-grade amethyst *is not* actually rare, but *is* apparently rare, and exceptionally difficult to find in the modern gem marketplace. Amethyst is a joy to cut, and relatively easy for beginners. If you have trouble with pre-polish or polish, try changing your lap direction - often helps with quart'z cyclical grain. If you are a beginner or money's tight, excellent Brazilian material can be had for between \$1 - \$3 per carat. Look for material with top clarity in lighter tones.

This budget includes the purchase of the new 24 inch saw and blade for the big saw room as the old saw is shot and Pete Peterson and Mike Tucker have a preference on which unit they want to buy (at a discounted price) and a way to avoid the shipping costs for the club. The proposed budget for 2018 was \$45,860 with an actual expenditure of \$41,767. The expenditures in 2018 included the unexpected water main repair cost of \$6000. The income for 2018 for the club was \$39,831. Since we had a quorum, the proposed budget was

approved unanimously by the members present.

- There was a vehicle left in the parking lot Friday, Jan. 11, after the last lab was finished. The monitor left the gate open to allow the car to be picked up. David has instructed monitors to LOCK the facility if they are the last ones to leave. If a car is left in the parking lot it WILL BE LOCKED behind the gates when the monitors leave the facility so don't leave your car here unless you are willing to wait until another monitor comes in.
- Silver Lab The blade in the new Potter sheet cutting tool has been damaged once again by someone cutting something other than the approved material and thickness. I will be bringing it down for repair next week and the tool will be out of commission for about two weeks again. We will be putting a lock on this tool when it comes back and in order to use the tool members will have to now do so under the supervision of the monitor on duty.
- Casting Lab Liz Williams is assuming the role of instructor and head.
- Faceting Lab Dave Richardson is the new lead of the faceting lab. Billy Bob will be teaching faceting beginning on Tuesdays. A signup sheet has been posted.
- The termite inspection from Truly Nolan was completed yesterday for the facility in order to retain our termite warranty.
- An anonymous member refurbished the sign for the training building, which certainly involved many hours of work.
- The door prize was won by Ben Santoro. The raffle netted \$176 in cash.



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


