


MEMBERSHIP DUES ARE DUE NOW





## January 2018 OPLC Speaker Eric Fritz: **Coral**



We are very fortunate to have our very own member, Eric Fritz, returning to give us another very unique presentation on our January 13, 2018 OPLC monthly meeting. He will be talking about Coral. Eric will share with us how Coral has been used as a gem material for well over 5000 years. Coral, an organic gemstone, similar in composition to pearls and the product of bio mineralization, is produced by living organisms. Black coral is the state Gemstone of Hawaii and currently protected by the endangered species Act. Red coral is commonly referred to as precious, as indeed it is. Red coral from the Mediterranean is still currently harvested under strict self imposed guidelines. We will look at all the types of gem quality corals on the market as well as the dyed and stabilized sponge and bamboo corals seen in huge piles at gem and bead shows. Native American jewelry has featured corals from Italy, and the Italians have a love for our Arizona turquoise. Corals are suitable for carving, cabbing and beads. Examples will be on hand for your hands on examination.

Eric Fritz, FGA, DGA, who has previous given us two excellent presentations, is a graduate gemologist. He is the North America Manager for the Gemological Association of Great Britain (Gem-A), the oldest gemological education provider in the world, holding both colored stone and diamond designations. The Gem-A offers online courses with onsite labs convenient to all students. Eric has a degree in Zoology from the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill. He moved from Hickory, North Carolina to Tucson in 2014, and has made Tucson his home. His zoology degree led him to a passion for pearls and other organic gem materials, which are Eric's specialty. He has a huge shell collection, "obsessive" as he calls it, which now resides beside the minerals and gemstones collection.

With all of Eric's travels, we are truly very fortunate to have him give this presentation. Looking forward to seeing you all in the New Year 2018!

# Natural vs. Enhanced Lapidary Materials

# Lecture presentation by Helen Serras-Herman, FGA AGTA GemFair Tucson Seminars Tucson Convention Center- GRAHAM Room, Sat February 3, 2018, 1:00-2:00pm



There is an endless inventory of lapidary gem materials on the market today created or enhanced to look like some other natural material, usually one that is rare and expensive. Most are natural materials that have been dyed or compressed to simulate a better quality material, or another natural material, while others are partly natural stone and partly other materials, such as resins, metals, etc.

All these simulants provide an inexpensive alternative to natural gems, and many of them are beautiful, with bold patterns, and durable to be used into jewelry. The only problem surrounding these stones is the lack of disclosure, as the cabochon and bead market almost slides quietly under the disclosure radar.

Helen Serras-Herman, gem artist and FGA gemologist, will discuss various natural vs. enhanced lapidary materials; among them the popular Sonora chrysocolla, natural turquoise vs. compressed blocks, sugilite vs. Mohave purple turquoise,

drusy gems, azurite with malachite, lapis, and rainbow calsilica.




